Block: Default Question Block (40 Questions)

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Hello. My name is Dr. Helen Agu. I am a scientist working at Michigan State University and University of Nigeria, Nsukka; I was awarded an Alliance for African Partnership Early Career Scientist Award. I would like to ask you about your opinions about women and wildlife trafficking with a focus on women in Sub-Saharan Africa. The purpose of this survey is research. Illegal wildlife trade and wildlife trafficking create risks for species and societies. These environmental risks have implications beyond species extinction and animal welfare. Wildlife trafficking is associated with corruption, money laundering, degradation of the rule of law, insecurity, spread of disease, decreased sustainable development, decreased of cultural resources and links with other crimes.

The role of women in wildlife trafficking remains mostly unknown. We lack information about the costs and benefits of participating in wildlife trafficking. We do not know if thinking about women's roles in wildlife trafficking is necessary for combating wildlife trafficking. We do not know if woman have different priorities to participate in efforts to reduce wildlife trafficking-related risks. We also lack insight about the nuances of women's participation in poaching, trafficking, and selling illegal wildlife products, either directly or in supporting roles. Thus, programs designed to combat wildlife trafficking may fail to achieve objectives, be monitored and evaluated using the wrong measures, or quiet the voice of key stakeholders.

Your participation in this survey will help me and my collaborators better understand the role of women in wildlife trafficking in Sub-Saharan Africa. There are no right or wrong answers to the questions in this survey. You do not have to be a woman or live in Sub-Saharan Africa to participate, however this is the geographic focus of the survey. Results will be published in a report and presented to groups involved in efforts to combat wildlife trafficking and illegal wildlife trade in Africa.

Michigan State University sets rules about how I conduct surveys. Some of these rules are that personal information such as your name will never be associated with your responses. I will only give your survey a number. The funding for this study comes from Michigan State University's Alliance for African Partnership and the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife.



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

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
